MENTORS



Associate Professor Greg Fealy Australian National University

Associate Professor Greg Fealy's interest in Indonesian politics and Islam was awakened as an undergraduate at Monash University and have remained the focus of his academic and professional activity since then. His PhD thesis was a study of the traditionalist Muslim party, Nahdlatul Ulama. More recently, he has examined terrorism, transnational Islamist movements and religious commodification in Indonesia, as well as broader trends in contemporary Islamic politics in Southeast Asia. His main research interests lie in Indonesian politics, modern Islamic political history, democratisation and Islamism, and jihadist ideology and strategy. Greg was formerly an Indonesian analyst with the Australian Government, and consultant on Indonesian civil society, election and Islamic education programs. He is currently Associate Professor at the Australian National University's School of International, Political and Strategic Studies.



Emeritus Professor Virginia Hooker Australian National University

Virginia Hooker obtained her B.A.(O.S.) Hons. degree from Australian National University, and a PhD degree from Monash University (1973). She has published widely on Islam and Southeast Asia and is now Emeritus Professor at the Department of Political and Social Change at the Australian National University. She currently researches the ethics and aesthetics of contemporary Islam-inspired art in Indonesia and Malaysia. Her publications include: Culture and Society in New Order Indonesia, editor and contributor, 1993, reprinted 1995; Writing a New Society: Social Change through the Novel in Malay, 2000; A Short History of Malaysia: Linking East and West, 2003; Islamic Perspectives on the New Millennium, editor (with Amin Saikal) 2004; Voices of Islam in Southeast Asia: A Contemporary Sourcebook (ed and contributor with Greg Fealy), 2006, 2007.



Dr Nadirsyah Hosen Monash University

Dr Nadirsyah Hosen has been working as a Senior Lecturer at the Faculty of Law, Monash University since 20 July 2015. Prior to this role, Nadir was an Associate Professor at the School of Law, University of Wollongong. He has a Bachelors degree (UIN Syarif Hidayatullah Jakarta), a Graduate Diploma in Islamic Studies, and Master of Arts with Honours (University of New England), as well as a Master of Laws in Comparative Law (Charles Darwin University). He completed his first PhD (Law) at the University of Wollongong and a second PhD (Islamic Law) at the National University of Singapore. Nadir is internationally known for his expertise on Shari'a and Indonesian law.

MENTORS



Professor Denny Indrayana Gadjah Mada University and The University of Melbourne

Professor Denny Indrayana is an internationally recognised anticorruption campaigner who has played a leading role in law reform efforts in Indonesia. Before being sworn in as Vice Minister of Law and Human Rights, Denny was Special Advisor for Legal Affairs, Human Rights and Anticorruption to President Yudhoyono, Chair of the Centre for the Study of Anti-Corruption at Gadjah Mada University, and Director of the Indonesian Court Monitoring NGO. He is currently a Visiting Professor at Melbourne Law School. Denny has a PhD from the Melbourne Law School and won the prestigious Australian Alumni Award in 2009. He has written hundreds of articles and books.





Professor Jamhari Makruf is lecturer and, until recently, Deputy Rector (Academic) at the Universitas Islam Negeri (UIN) Syarif Hidayatullah in Jakarta. Having received a PhD in anthropology from the Australian National University, Professor Jamhari is a reputed researcher on Islamic studies with a focus on the role of democracy in Islamic society and Muslim compatibility with civil society. Among his current interests and concerns is aggravated poverty in rural areas as an underlying root cause for the upsurge of religious fundamentalism. Professor Jamhari facilitates the interdisciplinary research activities of PPIM-UIN Jakarta, which are designed to enhance mutual understanding between Muslims and non-Muslims. His work is concerned with injustice against Muslim communities due to misperceptions, and explores the contemporary significance of Islam through the linkage with Western value systems.





M. C. Ricklefs is Professor Emeritus of the Australian National University, a Fellow of the Australian Academy of the Humanities and *erelid* (Honorary Member) of the Netherlands Koninklijk Instituut voor Taal-, Land- en Volkenkunde. He was formerly Director of the Research School of Pacific and Asian Studies at the Australian National University and more recently Professor of History at the National University of Singapore. He has written several books on Indonesian history, including most recently *The seen and unseen worlds in Java, 1726–49; Mystic synthesis in Java: A history of Islamisation from the fourteenth to the early nineteenth centuries; Polarising Javanese society: Islamic and other visions c.1830-1930; and Islamisation and its opponents in Java, c. 1930 to the present. His History of modern Indonesia has been published in both English and Indonesian-language editions.*
